#### **Outline**

How can the HEIs and other organisations involved in medicine, dentistry and healthcare education and training utilise interprofessional education in the most beneficial way? This event explores how other countries have dealt with the challenges associated with providing interprofessional education. We will also explore how interprofessional education is being delivered in England at present, from a number of different perspectives — namely policy, academic and student perspectives. Finally, we will aim to articulate what changes could or should be implemented at national level, university-level and faculty-level in order to ensure that England successfully delivers interprofessional education to its future medical, dental and healthcare workforce.
